Dear Friends

Before moving to Devon we lived in Hampton, Middx, where we paid our water bills to Thames Water, our police force was Thames Valley Police, the local secondary school in Twickenham was called Thames Valley School, Sunbury-on-Thames and Kingston-upon-Thames were nearby towns, and our Council Tax went to the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames.

You notice the common denominator in those facts? Yes, the river Thames was a dominant feature in that south west London suburb.

In a travel documentary that was on TV recently, Joanna Lumley tracked the river Danube from its origins in Germany to its delta in the Black Sea. In one episode she visited a monastery in Austria and there was a delightful scene where she was in the garden on the banks of the Danube, sharing afternoon tea with a nun. Sister Justina talked about how being by the river is refreshing and restorative, how its continuous flow, from source to destination and its passing through different landscapes, offers a metaphor of our lives.

My brother lived in Cricklade, close to the Cotswold meadow where a stone marks the trickle which is the source of the Thames. On a small footbridge across a tiny stream in the town, there's a brass plate that proudly states "*River Thames*". By the time it reaches Hampton Court, near where we lived, a substantial road bridge with three arches is required to take traffic across and the water is wide and deep enough for traditional River Thames passenger boats to offer cruises to Richmond, Kew or all the way to Westminster.

Rivers and the theme of water feature many times in the Bible. Probably the best known is from Psalm 23 ; "*He leads me beside quiet waters*" It's an image of our Lord guiding us to places of peace and refreshment where we can experience the restorative nature of God's presence.

I know many of us have been able to claim God's wonderful promise in Isaiah 43: "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you".

And, thinking of our final destination, we read of John's vision of heaven in Revelation 22: "Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God."

Whether it's the Thames or the Danube, the River Exe, Dart or Creedy, may these lovely rivers remind us of God's promises for our life's journey from beginning to end. And may we be able to echo the words of the hymn: "*Peace* (and in subsequent verses - love, joy, faith, hope) *is flowing like a river, flowing out through you and me." Hilary*
