

Dear Friends,

A few weeks ago, at about midnight, I was reading in bed when suddenly I was plunged into complete darkness. There was a power cut. With the merest flicker of light from a tiny torch with a fading battery I managed to make my way into the sitting room to find matches and a candle. Then into the bathroom where I had a candlestick on the window sill. So back to bed with my lit candle beside me. Then I received a message from the National Grid to say power would be restored by 3 a.m. Yes it was, but I thought morning will come and I'll be able to see anyway.

But as I lay awake feeling strangely isolated by a few hours of darkness I thought of those who are totally blind and will never see the dawn. In

future I shall try not to take precious sight for granted.

However, some of the most inspiring stories we shall ever encounter are from blind people who have refused to be defined by their disability.

Helen Keller, the American civil rights activist became deaf-blind before she was two years old due to illness. She learned to communicate and became the first deaf-blind

person to win a university degree. A Christian, she wanted all children to have equal opportunities and was an author and tireless campaigner for people with disabilities.

Then of course there was Fanny Crosby, the hymn writer, who was born blind but who refused to be pitied, indeed felt her blindness caused her other senses to be greatly accentuated. Certainly she had an amazing memory and learned whole books of the Bible by heart. Education was important to her and she attended an early school for the blind, learning to play the piano,

organ, harp and guitar and was a good soprano singer. We have two of her hymns in our book and they're favourites - *Blessed Assurance* and *To God be the Glory* (StF548, StF94). Thank you, Fanny, for those.

In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus says we should shed light among others so that when they see the good we do they may praise our Father in heaven. Although blind, Helen Keller and Fanny Crosby certainly fulfilled Our Lord's request.

We all know that famous painting by Holman Hunt, the Light of the World. It depicts Jesus holding a lantern in his left hand and knocking on a door with the other. There is no handle on the door, it can only be opened from the inside.

The door represents the human heart and so Our Lord is pleading for us to open up and let Him in. Surely we cannot refuse him admittance?

"Christ be our light! Shine in our hearts, shine through the darkness."
