Dear Friends Phew!

I wonder if that exclamation sums up how you feel at this time of year? For some it may be an expression of relief that Christmas and all the extra activities involved are now at an end. For others it may also be a relief to have got through Christmas, but for very different reasons. Those with heavy hearts, for whom the season has not been merry and bright, and for whom finding peace and joy has been difficult at a time when it's supposed to be plentiful.

With the arrival of 2026 the thoughts of some now turn to New Year's resolutions, though I'm not sure how many people still resolve to join a gym or go on a diet as it's pretty well known that around 90% of these resolutions are abandoned within just a few months. It was popular in Roman times, however, when the god Janus (after whom January is named) was honoured. He was the god of new beginnings who had two faces, one looking to the past and the other to the future, and on 1st January people reflected on the past year and set goals for the future.

Last January, at Friday Focus, we had a quiz on Janus words which are single words with two opposite meanings. An example is BOUND which can mean (1) to be restrained from movement, e.g. tied up and (2) moving towards a destination e.g. 'bound for Paris'.

Just for fun, I wonder if you can think of the two opposite meanings of these three Janus words? DUST. SCREEN. BOLT. The answers are on another page in the notices.

Janus was a god of Roman mythology, in contrast to Jesus Christ, the only true God, the alpha and omega, the beginning and the end. In 2 Corinthians Paul says, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come

As we step over the threshold into a New Year none of us can know for sure what it will hold – what joys, sadnesses, challenges and delights. Yet whilst we do not know what the future holds, we can know the One who holds the future in His hands. Minnie Louise Haskins' poem is called "God knows" and, though often quoted at this time of year, I make no apologies for repeating it below.

*And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:
"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."*
